Course Overview:

This full year course focuses on world history from the 17th century to the present. It is the second part to the two year sequence of global history and geography. We will focus on major global themes such as absolutism, nationalism, imperialism, industrialism, revolutions, world wars, and human rights violations. Students will be required to take a mid-term exam in January and the New York State Global History Regents Examination in June.

- Students are to be on time, follow the class rules, and be prepared with all the necessary tools needed to complete assigned tasks.
