Course Overview:

This full year course focuses on world history from prehistory to the 17th century. It is the first part to the two year sequence of global history and geography. We will focus on geography, religion, achievements, politics, economics, and social structures of early civilizations in Asia, Africa, the Middle East, and South America. We will also learn about empires, dynasties, and explore turning points that have brought us into the modern world. Students will be required to take a mid-term exam in January and a final examination in June.
